VA Resolves Problem with Surviving Spouse Payments

The Veterans Affairs Department is taking action to identify and pay surviving spouses who are eligible to receive a one-time pension payment or compensation for the month of the veteran's death. Spouses who mistakenly had to repay the money also are included.

Spouses who never applied for survivor benefits are the ones most likely affected, according to VA.

The VA is attempting to identify eligible recipients, but a Survivors' Call Center also has been opened to assist spouses who believe they are entitled. The call center number is 1-800-749-8387. The center is open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday-Friday Arizona time. Inquiries also can be submitted online at:

Message from Attorney General Terry Goddard

Life Care Planning is an important task for all of us, whether young or old, healthy or facing challenges. Through increased awareness and access to information, Arizonans of all ages can make their choices known about who will manage their affairs in the event of an emergency. My Office has recently produced *Life Care Planning for Everyone*, a short video presentation that will encourage open discussions so that well reasoned choices can be made **before** an emergency – choices that will significantly reduce stress on families.

November Board and Member Meeting Summaries

Board of Directors, December 4.

Present: Terry Tassin, Ron Perkins, Dan Conway, John Ady, Bill Roscher, Gary & Marie Fredricks, Ron Green, Gregg Maxon, Rob Welch, Chuck Schluter, Ron Worthington, Jim Cullison.

Terry Tassin has ordered JROTC medals for the 17 schools the chapter supports.

Gary Fredricks briefed on the 4 primary MOAA areas of concern for 2009: Active/Reserve Force issues, Healthcare, Retirement/Survivor issues, and Veterans/family and other issues. A detailed description of these areas can be viewed on MOAA's Web site under Legislative Action.

Terry Tassin reported that current membership is 194. The chapter goal is to have 200 members by the end of 2008. Several of the names provided by National under the year-end recruiting initiative have signed up for chapter membership. The chapter has 11 "Give Me Ten" new members.

A suggestion was made to schedule a Personal Affairs workshop for members. John Ady, Bill Roscher and Dan Conway all volunteered to put together a Personal Affairs presentation.

Marie Fredricks confirmed the chapter has 40 seats reserved for the Broadway Dinner Theater in July. Ron Worthington's motion to have a picnic in October and host the ESGR Award Recognitions passed unanimously.

Gregg Maxon suggested the chapter investigate doing a joint event with the Arizona Guard or Reserve. Chuck Schluter will look into the options.

Ron Worthington gave a brief summary of the JROTC Scholarship timeline for awarding the scholarships.

Chuck Schluter made a motion to donate \$500 to the Arizona National Guard Emergency Relief Fund. It passed unanimously.

Everyone who contributes to the chapter's web site was reminded to review their inputs and keep them up to date.

The board changed the start time for BOD meetings to 1100-1300. The board agreed to continue competing in the following three MOA communication award categories: Print Newsletter, Electronic Newsletters and Web Site. Terry Tassin volunteered to submit the chapter's inputs.

Member Luncheon, December 20.

The General Membership luncheon/meeting was held December 20 with 69 members and guests present. Christmas music was provided by Don Ford.

Treasurer Bill Roscher reported that the General Fund had \$6,596.11 and the Scholarship Fund \$9,902.90 for a combined total of \$16,499.01

President Terry Tassin reminded everyone that it's time to renew membership for 2009. Dues remain the same: \$20 for regular members and \$10 for Auxiliaries.

Several members donated toys for needy children for Terry Tassin to deliver for the USMC Reserves' Toys for Tots program.

The January program will be at McCormick Ranch Golf Club. Guest will be Bill Wolf, who will speak on WW II aviation and munitions.

Meritorious Service Medals and Oak Leaf Clusters were presented to Gary Fredricks, 3rd OLC; Marie Fredricks, 1st OLC; Ron Perkins 1st OLC; Terry Tassin, 4th OLC; Fran Tassin, and Chuck Schluter, 4th OLC. Pat and Patricia Dale were absent and will receive their awards in January. Bill Johnson's MSM also will be presented posthumously then to his wife Nina.

A Christmas Chinese Auction was moderated by Ron Perkins where several gifts were chosen by the lucky raffle ticket holders. Board members donated all the gifts. The raffle ticket money, which amounted to \$278, went to the scholarship fund.

Legislative Update

As 2008 comes to a close, and we await the beginning of the 2009 legislative year at the state and federal levels, the overwhelming issue that pervades everything else is the "R" word – Recession. It is becoming increasingly clear that it will continue to be so for the foreseeable future. Within this scenario I found a recent article by MOAA's Government Relations Director, Steve Strobridge, to be enlightening. The article titled "As I See It – Prioritizing in Hard Times" was contained in the weekly MOAA legislative update and can be viewed on the MOAA website at www.MOAA.org.

Steve points out that the January Washington Scene column of *Military Officer* lays out our goals for the year, with the goals running seven pages. He notes that prioritizing is required, because it is not possible to succeed with that many actions in any given year. We will always highlight the most severe inequities, but prioritizing in practice is often a continuing work in progress that is strongly influenced by economic realities. Also influencing the process is the support or lack of it from key congressional cosponsors and their sympathetic staffers.

This year the reality is that we have an economic crisis. This in no way means we should not continue to stand up for our military, our veterans, their families and survivors. Almost everyone is still also predicting that for the foreseeable future the country will face a period of "persistent conflict" which will continue to tax our military's capabilities.

We have the added unknown of a new Administration that is coming together rapidly, but the details of its policies are still pretty much unknown. We no doubt will see a reduction in our military presence in Iraq, but will likely see a corresponding increase in that presence in Afghanistan, at least in the short run. Historically, there has always been a propensity to seek a "peace dividend" when a major conflict, such as Iraq, begins to wind down. We can anticipate some of that this year. On the legislative side, we also have unknowns as we will be losing some staunch supporters such as Senator Warner and Congressman Duncan Hunter. We can anticipate an interesting, if difficult, year ahead with our goals sure to be in a state of flux as the unknowns become realities.

Against this background, we begin the year with a clear understanding of our issues. Our immediate goals are well thought out and clear. The top 10 in no particular order are: sustain defense budget funding, sustain the projected manpower increases, pursue needed fixes for wounded warriors and their families,

resist shifting health care costs to beneficiaries, reverse Medicare/TRICARE payment cuts, end the DIC offset to SBP, end any deduction of VA disability benefits from military retired pay, restore military pay comparability, upgrade Guard/Reserve retirement and health programs, and improve military family support. The current thinking is to focus on sustaining the defense budget, resisting health care costs to beneficiaries and fixing SBP inequities during our April Storming the Hill event.

On the state level, we see similar circumstances with a new legislature to be seated in early January, Secretary of State Jan Brewer deeply involved in her transition to Governor and a state budget deficit forecast for over \$1.2 billion this year and more next year. We are already halfway through the state fiscal year, leaving only the second half to rectify the current budget shortfall. The first order of business has to be the current deficit. Fundamentally, Arizona state law says you can't have one. Immediately thereafter, the business will be establishing the budget for next year. Any other bills that effect veterans are not likely to receive much attention this year.

Our best approach at this time seems to be in supporting the Arizona Department of Veteran's
