Dr. Schnur, CPT USA (Frm), trained in general surgery and plastic surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.,


and later was chairman of the Division of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at the Mayo Clinic Arizona.

Arizona History Comes to Life at March Meeting





State Historian Marshall Trimble entertained with delightful tales of Arizona and finished up with a lively song.



Ever wonder why the Arizona community of Why is named Why? Sixty-seven chapter members and guests found out why from Marshall Trimble, guest speaker at the March luncheon. Answer: because travelers passing through the remote community wondered why anyone would want to live there. Trimble, Arizona's official state historian, delighted the audience with witty tales of Arizona lore, including stories of his life growing up in the Grand Canyon State.

Place names and their origins were popular subjects of his talk, and the audience learned a number of obscure facts. For instance, the town of Snowflake's name has nothing to do with winter snow (the town founders' last names were Snow and Flake), and the community of Pinetop was named after a local bartender nicknamed Pinetop and not for the extensive Ponderosa Pine forest that surrounds it. Route 66. which traversed northern Arizona in its heyday, was another source of stories, including an account of Rimmy Jim Giddings and his disdain for salesmen and snooty

tourists who stopped at his wayside shop along Route 66 east of Flagstaff.

Trimble generated many laughs with his humorous stories, and ended his presentation with a whimsical song about military life. It's safe to say that for this meeting a

good time was had by all.

GEN Lucius Clay, USA, military governor of Germany after World War II, initiated the Berlin Airlift; April 23, 1897.


GEN Ulysses S. Grant, USA, commander of Union forces in the Civil War, President of the U.S. 1869-77; April 27, 1822.

TECHNIQUE	TECHNIQUE ADVANTAGES		
Bypass Trust	Insures that property is maintained to provide income to surviving spouse; gives property to surviving children after death of second spouse; may minimize estate tax for married couples.	Assets must be individually owned by the spouses; may be expensive to establish and maintain; assets in the trust are not under the direct control of the surviving spouse.	
Charitable Remainder Trust	Insures receipt of gift by charity; provides immediate gift tax deduction; provides income to non-charitable beneficiaries during their lifetime.	Some taxpayers may not be able to use the gift tax deduction.	
Durable Power of Attorney	Allows expected descendent to exercise financial management during a period of disability without court appointed guardianship; inexpensive to implement.	Potential of abuse of authority by appointed individual.	
Gifts	Allows expected descendent to transfer during their lifetime to an intended beneficiary; can avoid taxes if amount is under the annual exclusion limit.	From a tax perspective it may not be suitable to make gifts of high value, non-divisible assets.	
Living Trust	Avoids probate and protects privacy while providing financial management of personal affairs during periods of disability.	Can be expensive to establish and maintain.	
Living Will	Allows an individual to specify medical treatment in the event they become terminally ill.	No major disadvantages.	
Property Ownership Through Joint Tenancy	Inexpensive to implement; transfers property at death without probate.	Joint Tenant has legal rights over property during the expected descendant's lifetime, surviving tenant may pay capital gains tax.	
Qualified Terminable Interest Property Trust (Q-TIP)	Provides trust income to the surviving spouse while allowing the originator of the trust to control the final distribution of the trust assets.	No major disadvantages.	



Legislative Update by Gary Fredricks, Legislative Chair

New Veterans Home Breaks Ground

On March 19 I had the privilege of participating in the ground breaking ceremony for the Arizona Veterans' Home – Tucson. Whereas this is not technically a legislative event, it required a lot of work by various veterans associations to get and to keep the state and federal funding through the legislatures to make this a reality. Governor Brewer was the keynote speaker at the ground breaking ceremony, and several state legislators were in attendance.

In 2004 following the recommendations of the Arizona Veterans Task Force to the governor and to the legislature, the State of Arizona proposed the construction of a second Arizona State Veterans Home to be located adjacent to the campus of the Southern Arizona VA Health Care System in Tucson. The nearly \$27 million project is a joint venture between the Arizona Department of Veterans Services and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, with the U.S. covering 65% of the cost for the project from economic recovery funding and the state legislature providing 35% of the total funding.

Intended to serve the southern tier Arizona counties of Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Pima, Pinal and Santa Cruz, the 137,000 square foot home will consist of four 30-bed long-term care units and a community/administration building. Residents will enjoy private rooms with full bath in a homelike environment with the best of skilled health care and services. The schedule provides for completion in September 2011, and the facility will ultimately employ 150 people and create an annual payroll of more than \$10 million. The ultimate goal toward which we are working will eventually include three more veterans homes and four more veterans cemeteries in Arizona.

State Legislature Moves Past Budget

With the completion of the FY2011 state budget in mid-March, the Arizona legislature was able to turn its attention to the various other bills that had been pretty much held in committees. We understand that the legislature has resumed committee hearings and that the plan is for the House and Senate to work on bills during the next few weeks in order to adjourn about the first or second week of May. There are still about 30 bills that have implications for the military/veteran community in work at various stages in the legislature. It should also be noted that the FY2011 budget, as passed, will provide continuity in state veterans services but is dependent on voter passage of a temporary sales tax increase in a May election.

Medicare/TRICARE Saga Continues

At the federal level, it gives me no pleasure to say that the Medicare/TRICARE payment to doctors saga goes on and on. We did aet another temporary reprieve with a deadline extension approved from March 1 to April 1. As I write this, the Senate has passed a bill to extend the deadline again to October 1. However, the House is still struggling with its companion bill which is currently tied to the jobs bill. That complication and the fact that Congress will shortly be taking a couple of weeks off is not encouraging. Let's keep our fingers crossed once again. (Editor's note: The issue was still unresolved as The Sentinel went to press. Members can check the latest status on the MOAA website, www.MOAA.org.)

On the good news side, Rep. Walter Jones has introduced a "discharge petition" to repeal the deduction of VA benefits from military widows' SBP annuities. This has been one of MOAA's key issues for several years now, and this new strategy is certainly welcome. It's a bit complex, but suffice it to say that it is a way around the congressional rules requirement to specify a specific funding offset. MOAA is asking us to send e-mails to our congressmen in support of this bill, which is H.R. 775. Again, you can do this easily through our website at www.MOAA.org.


