Legislative Update

The annual budget battles are beginning in earnest in Washington. On the VA side, MOAA recently met with the House Veteran's Affairs committee to promote full funding of the VA health care system, oppose yet another proposed increase in certain user fees and drug co-pays, implement a timely "seamless transition" between military and VA programs, increase funding for medical research and construction and restore cuts in the VA claims processing system. Casualties from Iraq and Afghanistan continue to impose a heavy load on the VA system with polytrauma treatment for severely wounded veterans a truly new experience. Streamlining and fully funding the system are imperative.

The other current "big hitter" is the proposal in the President's FY2007 budget request to substantially increase health care fees for retirees under age 65 and to impose a 67% increase in retail pharmacy co-pays for all beneficiaries except active duty. As an example, current TRICARE PRIME annual enrollment fees for retiree's is \$230 for individuals and \$460 for families. Under the new proposal, retired officers of all ranks would pay \$700 per individual and \$1400 per family. The Asst Sec Def for Health Affairs has testified that the large majority of savings projected would be from the 150,000 folks who would be driven away from TRICARE entirely by the fee increases.

Whereas there is certainly some merit for consideration in some of the statistics that the DOD and JCS are using to support their position, it's difficult to understand the magnitude of the proposed increases and the claim that the pro-

posal "puts priority on sustaining the current benefits." With all the "pork" that gets funded every year, it's also a real stretch to accept the rationale that health care costs, including TRI-CARE For Life", are impacting the services ability to buy weapons systems.

It is in our best interest to continue to keep up a substantial barrage of grassroots inputs to Congress over the next months. We can help that cause by signing and mailing the four tear-out letters to the top Armed Services Committee leaders that are enclosed in the February MOAA magazine (two at page 34 and two at page 50).

By the way, read the letters. They are well written and are a good reminder that we really earned these benefits in ways that most other folks cannot appreciate. Finally, look for similar letters to our Arizona Congressmen that will be included in the March magazine issue. As President of the Arizona Council of Chapters, I will be traveling to Washington the last week in March for the annual "Storming the Hill" session. The proposed fee in-

Personal Affairs

- 1. Do you really know how to forward e-mails? 20% of us do; 80% **DO NOT**. Preventing identity theft and stopping SPAMMERS is everyone's iob!
- 2. Every time you forward an e-mail there are names and addresses left over from the people who got the message before you. As the messages get forwarded along, the list of addresses builds. Someone can take all of those addresses and sell them or send junk mail to them. To thwart their efforts, follow two easy steps:
- a. When you forward an e-mail, **DELETE** all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message you received. Clean them up!!!!! That's right, **DELETE** those addresses. You **MUST** click the "Forward" button first. This gives you full editing capabilities of the message. If you don't click on "Forward" first, you won't be able to edit the message at all.
- b. VITAL: When you send an e-mail to more than one person, **Do NOT** use the To: or Cc: columns for adding e-mail addresses. Always use the BCC: (blind carbon copy) column for listing the e-mail addresses.
- (1) This is the way that people you send to only see their own e-mail address. If you don't see your BCC: option, click on where it says To: and your address list will appear. Highlight the address you want to send to, then choose BCC: and that's it.
- (2) When you send to BCC: your message will automatically say "Undisclosed Recipients in the "TO:" field
- c. Remove any and all "FW" in the subject line. You can re-name the subject so that is more appropriate or fix spelling.
- d. Hit the Forward button from the **ACTUAL** e-mail you are reading!!! There is nothing more frustrating than having to click through 10 pages to finally get to the one page you're supposed to view. It is annoying, time consuming, and unnecessary. By Forwarding from the actual page, you stop the recipient from having to open many e-mails just to see what you sent.

I have just received 50 copies of the latest "Help Your Survivors Now", the MOAA publication to help you prepare for your family's future. It has expanded from 58 pages to 79 pages, and has a ton of good information, but you must read it to get this information. They have a price tag of \$14.95 per copy, but yours will be **free** if you come to the March luncheon! See you there!
